You are not required to have your own DSLR camera for this subject, although it would be helpful. If you are looking to buy a camera, we recommend that you seek advice from your local camera shop in order to get the best camera for your budget. It need not be a new/expensive model. There are also second hand cameras sold online that may keep costs down.

The aim of the bridging work is to give you an opportunity to explore and discover various forms of Fine Art Photography that could inspire your own independent work later in the A Level course. Please document your work by using Google Slides.

All bridging work must be completed by 17/9 and forms part of your Pupil Passport at Coombe Wood Sixth Form.

Starting Points *(Select at least 2)*

1. Understanding Composition:

- **Research the following composition techniques: Rule of Thirds, Leading Lines, Framing, and Symmetry.**
- **Take at least three photos demonstrating each technique (total of 12 photos).**
- **Write a brief explanation (2-3 sentences) for each photo, describing how you applied the technique.**

2. Exploring Light and Shadow:

- **Experiment with natural and artificial light sources.**
- **Take a series of 6 photos that explore how light and shadow can create mood and depth.**
- **Include a mix of indoor and outdoor settings.**
- **Write a short reflection on what you learned about light and how it affects your images.**

3. Capturing Motion:

- **Learn about shutter speed and its effect on capturing motion.**
- **Take at least 4 photos: two using fast shutter speed to freeze**

- motion and two using slow shutter speed to create motion blur.
- Annotate your photos with the camera settings used and any challenges you faced.

4. Research Project:

- Choose a photographer whose work you find inspiring.
- Create a presentation (5-10 slides) about the photographer's life, style, and key works.
- Include examples of their photos and explain why you chose them.
- Reflect on how their work influences or inspires your own photographic style.

Materials Needed:

- A DSLR camera or smartphone with a camera
- A digital document for your photography journal (e.g. Google Slides)
- Access to a computer or tablet for research and creating your presentation.

Submission:

- Compile all your photos, notes, and reflections into a single digital document.
- Submit your work on or before the first day of the A Level Photography course.

Tips for Success:

- Experiment and take risks with your photography—this is a time to explore and learn.
- Be mindful of composition, lighting, and subject matter in your photos.
- Reflect honestly on your experiences and what you discover about photography and yourself as an artist.
