# Summer 2026 – Exams Season – GCSE and A Level



# ESFA Super League - Semi Final Place Secured!!!

Coombe Wood's U18 programme has put together a really strong run in this year's ESFA Super League, earning a place in the national semi-finals after a 5-1 win over Portsmouth College.

The group stage set the tone. The boys finished top of their group, showing consistency and a good level of control in their performances. That carried into the knockout round, where they came through a tough game against Epsom College, managing the occasion well and finding a way to get the result.

The quarter-final was probably the most complete performance of the run so far. Portsmouth were a hardworking, honest side who made it difficult, but the boys approached the game in the right way. They were disciplined, aggressive when needed, and clinical in front of goal, which ultimately created the gap in the scoreline.

To be in the last four in the country in this competition is a significant achievement. There is real depth in the ESFA Super League, so to come through the group and two knockout rounds says a lot about the group, both in terms of ability and how they have approached each game.

The semi-final now brings a local edge, with Coombe Wood facing Royal Russell. As neighbours, it adds something extra to the occasion, and it should be a good, competitive game between two strong programmes.

There is also the added incentive of what comes next. The final will be played at Stoke City's stadium, which is a great opportunity for the players. The focus now is on preparing properly and giving themselves the best chance to take that next step.

It has been a very positive run so far, and one the players and staff can take a lot of credit for. We look forward to seeing how far they can go.

# Old Bailey Central Criminal Court, London Trip

## March 2026

Last week, our Year 13 A-level Sociology students had the valuable opportunity to visit the historic Old Bailey Central Criminal Court, in London to observe the criminal justice system in action.

During the visit, students were able to sit in public galleries and observe a range of live court proceedings. These included cases connected to counter-terrorism investigations, corporate manslaughter, and other serious criminal trials such as murder. Seeing these proceedings firsthand provided students with a powerful insight into how the justice system operates in practice and helped bring many of the themes studied within their A-level Sociology Paper 3 Crime and Deviance Unit, to life.



# Iceland Trip - Feb 2026

23 students and 3 staff from CWS had the pleasure of visiting the wonderful country of snow and ice, Iceland, this half term. We met very early on Sunday 16th February and departed London Gatwick, excited to see what Iceland had in store- for all students it was going to be their first visit to Iceland.

Upon arrival in Iceland we made our first 2 stops and experienced the bridge that connects 2 continents and experienced the first of the real volcanic landscape at the Hot springs, which despite the smell of sulphur in the air, was enjoyed thoroughly by all. Our coach then took us to our hotel for the first night in the capital of Reykjavik- students were given some down time in their rooms to unpack before we all headed off to a local burger restaurant and enjoyed some very well made burgers and chips.

After our meal we had been told that there was a very high chance the Northern lights were going to make an appearance, so we headed down to the coastal area and joined many others who were waiting to see them. We were very fortunate and even though they did not fill the sky with their brightness they were there for all to see- a wonderful end to our first day.

Day 2, a very busy day, saw us travel many miles and head to the southern tip of Iceland and en route we stopped of at the famous Skogafoss waterfall and took in the delights of this wonderful spot where students enjoyed the walk up to waterfall and enjoyed getting up and close to the waterfall. Our next stop of the day was our walk on the Glacier, Solheimajokull- a once in a lifetime experience for so many of us. We put on our harnesses, crampons and held our ice picks in hand ready to explore the wonderful Glacier- our guide took us into and on top of the glacier and we were able to truly experience the stunning sights and appreciate the sheer size and wonder of this huge ice sheet. We made one more stop at Gullfoss waterfall on the way to our accommodation for the night which were some wonderful cabins in Hellisholar. After dinner in the main building we were again extremely fortunate to experience the Northern lights one more time and many of us were of the opinion that these were the best of the 2 nights- slightly brighter and filled more of the sky.

Day 3, was another busy day which took us to the famous Golden circle, where students could watch in awe and wonder at the natural Geysirs, an Icelandic dairy farm where we got to taste the very delicious locally made Icelandic ice cream and the famous small town of Vik and the south beach. Each stop was enjoyed by all and allowed the students to really see the uniqueness of this wonderful country. Our final night was spent in the capital again, after a walking tour and we enjoyed a pizza buffet before heading to our beds after a very busy day.

Day 4, our final day, saw us visit the wonderful Blue Lagoon- students were able to enjoy several hours in the hot baths with their volcanic face masks, sauna and steam room. I think a highlight of the trip for many of us. We then departed the Blue Lagoon and headed to the airport to make our return flight home. This was a truly wonderful Geography trip and many students have already asked us to run another trip there again in the future.

In February, nine Coombe Wood School students travelled to Mumbai, India for a 15-day international placement as part of the UK Government's Turing Scheme.

The students were hosted by the OSCAR Foundation, a Sport for Development organisation that uses education and football to support children and young people from some of Mumbai's most disadvantaged communities. The placement was supported by Volenti Academy, who helped organise and prepare the group for the experience.

During their time in Mumbai, the students worked closely with OSCAR's community programmes. They supported football coaching sessions, helped deliver English lessons and educational activities, and spent time with children in the communities where OSCAR operates. The experience gave our students a powerful insight into how sport and education can help create opportunity and hope for young people facing challenging circumstances.

Alongside their volunteering work, the group were able to explore the culture and sporting life of India. Highlights included attending a World T20 cricket match and visiting local cricket development programmes, giving the students a real taste of the country's passion for sport.

The trip was an incredibly positive experience for everyone involved. Our students have returned with a broader understanding of the world and the important role that sport and education can play in bringing communities together.

# Grantham Art Prize - Closing Date Monday 13<sup>th</sup> April 2026

---

Hi there

I am getting in touch from the [Grantham Climate Art Prize](#) to remind staff and students of the deadline for this year's competition of Mon 13 April. Schools can enter a collage and/ or students can submit individual entries.

We also have some news - we are now able to offer a £500 prize, plus a pack of art materials, to the winner and two £250 prizes to runners up.

## **Enter the 2026 Grantham Climate Art Prize**

Young people age 11 – 25 can now win £500 and a box of art materials in the 2026 Grantham Climate Art Prize, a competition that invites them to design a mural depicting a sustainable city. The 20m long and 2.4m high mural will be situated at Imperial College's White City campus. Students from schools, colleges and universities can submit a design for the mural with the theme: What does a thriving, vibrant city full of innovation and nature look and feel like?

They will need to consider a list of innovative and eco-solutions to create an eye-catching design available here: [www.imperial.ac.uk/grantham/events/grantham-art-prize/](http://www.imperial.ac.uk/grantham/events/grantham-art-prize/)

The winning design will be selected by a panel including the mural artist and experts in climate change and innovation at Imperial College. It will be transformed into a large-scale mural by professional artist Jeru Nomi.

Runner-up designs will be exhibited on the campus as part of an exhibition alongside the winning mural and there be cash prizes for two runners up (£250 each).

The Grantham Climate Art Prize is an award run by the Grantham Institute at Imperial College London that invites young people to design murals drawing attention to the climate crisis and the need for action to create a more sustainable world.

Previous art prize themes have included British Biodiversity Loss (2021) and A Greener, Cleaner, Cooler World (2023), inspired by the Grantham Institute's 9 things you can do about climate change (<https://www.imperial.ac.uk/stories/climate-action/>) and From Grey to Green: Design the Future 2025.

We now have 13 murals across Great Britain – from Brighton to Glasgow – and exhibitions of winning and runner-up designs, including at COP26 and COP30, in museums, and on billboards in London's transport hubs.

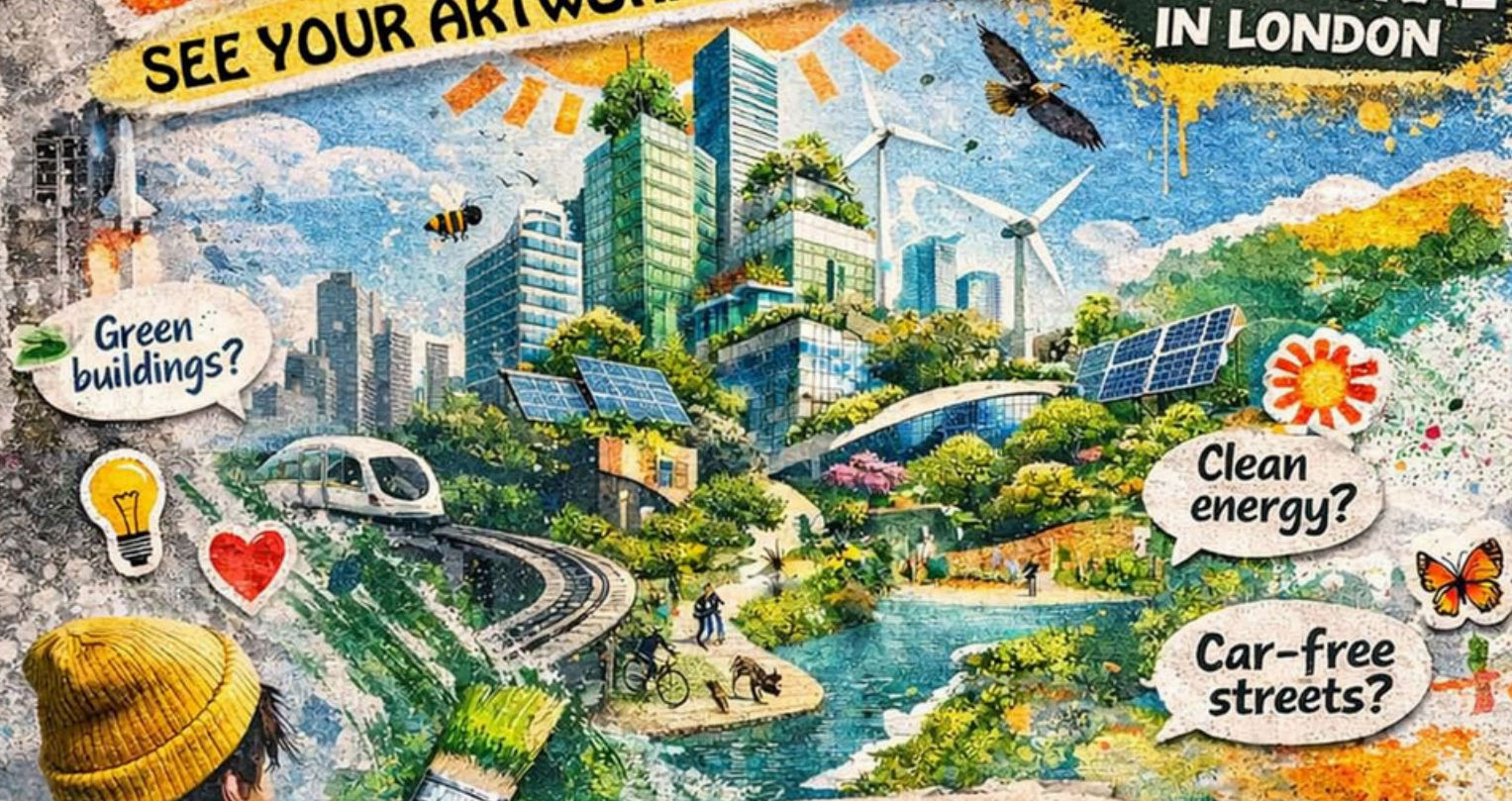
